This Report is designed to give you an overview of both facts and faces of the Federal Association as we serve Our Lords the Poor and the Sick in many wonderful ways.

Just as the Order lives one week each year “in convent” during the Pilgrimage at Lourdes, we work together “in community” during the rest of the year with our fellow dames, knights, chaplains, candidates, auxiliaries, spouses and friends. It is not too much to say that it is a foretaste of the Kingdom of Heaven. To paraphrase Msgr. Brouwet, the new Bishop of Tarbes and Lourdes, the salvation to which we are called is not an individual salvation. 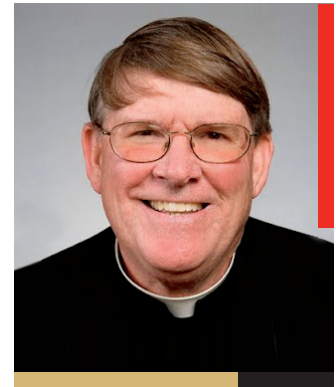

Treasurer's Report



The Federal Association made good progress in its financial position during the year ended December 31, 2012. Continuing the trend evident last year, we witnessed a marked increase in participation in the Annual Appeal with a 12% increase in the total dollars received on a comparable appeal to date basis. The average gift remains roughly at the \$1,325 level. That being said, there is still room for improvement in order to reach our long-standing goal of 100% member and candidate participation. Similarly, there are now eighty-three members in the Blessed Gerard Society of members who have included the Order in their estate plans. As we celebrate the 900th anniversary

year of our founding, we hope that each of you will consider testamentary gifts to the Federal Association as you review your affairs with your advisors.

Realized and unrealized gains of almost \$200,000 in our investment portfolios allowed the Association's net assets to increase by over \$164,000 for the year versus a decline of \$75,000 in 2011. Importantly, during 2012 we fully incorporated adherence to the US Conference of Catholic Bishops investment guidance into our managed portfolios.

The accompanying table provides highlights of our financial status at year end. The full audited financial report is available for your review on the Association's website.

Hospitaller's Report 2012

Federal Association members answered the call to administer to the needs of the sick and the poor in expanded numbers in 2012 by continuing our involvement with the other two associations in rebuilding New Orleans, increasing spiritual activities, and emphasizing the defense of the faith in renewed ways. We also grew our membership, investing 42 new knights and dames and accepted 59 candidates into Formation for the coming year with notable growth coming from the Southern and Western parts of our Association. Our membership actively engaged in their communities as these highlights from the past year show. Thank you to all our

hospitallers for their stewardship and especially to our three new leaders, Paul David of Lafayette, Pat Fallon of Syracuse, and Dorothy Zolandz of Washington DC. A heartfelt thank you to Kathy Mezzalingua who was our Syracuse hospitaller for six years, and Dan Bouligny who was the first hospitaller for Lafayette and served six years. Thank you both for your great service.

In my first year as the Association Hospitaller, I thought it would be good to share these ideas, and invite your help and counsel as we move forward. I personally welcome each and every suggestion, and you should feel free to offer ideas or opinions through your local hospitaller. We meet at least

twice a year where we discuss input from the membership, and will be working to increase the transparency between the hospitallers and our members in several ways. For example, we publish an agenda of upcoming meetings in the Order of Malta Moment for our members to comment through our hospitallers on what you would like to have discussed at our meetings. This allows members to comment on the agenda and have issues they want discussed to be included on the agenda. Moreover, each month a region is featured in the Order of Malta Moment telling about its signature project.



Our regions are each unique, and function in an entrepreneurial fashion to serve their communities' needs and defend our faith. We continue to focus on deepening *Spirituality*, performing *Good Works*, and growing our *Membership* in meaningful ways. And of course, when we focus first on spiritual formation, our vocation to help others naturally follows. I encourage everyone to visit other regions, build stronger relationships and knowledge, and thus contribute to making our Malta family stronger.

In this report you will find a few highlights and examples from throughout our regions of the wonderful activities that fulfill our mission as Knights and Dames of the Order of Malta.

Across the Regions

- Anointing of the Sick Masses, Celebrations for the Feast of St. John the Baptist, Days and Evenings of Reflection, Masses for the Sanctity of Life and in honor of our Deceased Members, were heartedly conducted in all of our regions.
- Many regions worked this year to build the regional committee structure that will, in the longer term, increase the number of projects and members active in their regions. Chairpersons were recruited to assist the Regional Hospitaller in implementing Spirituality, Defense of the Faith, and Auxiliary recruitment.

- A number of our regions have continued their support of the New Orleans Homebuilding Program, an effort that began in 2006. During this 6th year of assistance, 65 Federal Association members, families and friends participated.

Helping Those in Need

- Members of the Order from Washington DC to Memphis volunteer each month in supporting the **Missionaries of Charity**. In Washington members pray with residents and serve food alongside the sisters. In Memphis, volunteers administer to the needs of the women and children's shelter.
- Greater Washington, DC area members engage throughout the year with the young mothers and children who are cared for and educated through **St. Ann's Center for Children, Youth and Families** in Hyattsville.
- **The Solidarity School / the Hispanic Mission** has been the signature project in Atlanta for 10 years. Volunteers plan and produce the annual Christmas and Graduation Celebrations for the students and families. Throughout the years the members of Malta have painted rooms, set up the library, installed computer systems, cleaned the playground, and continue to read to the students throughout the week. Through a Malta grant, a van was donated to transport the students. The members are currently working to set up a Medical Program for students and their families to replace the semimonthly visits of the St Joseph's Hospital Mercy Mobile van organized several years ago.
- The Charlotte Region and Triad area provide **Room In the Inn**, to shelter homeless men during the winter providing hot supper, social time, and overnight accommodations. In the morning a hot breakfast and a bag lunch are provided. The region also supports priests and brothers of the **Missionaries of the Poor** who minister to the needy.

- Atlanta is raising funds for the **Advice & Aid Pregnancy Center** and helped grow the Center's budget. Their donations have helped secure a sonogram machine to help educate the clients and ultimately save the lives of babies.
- Columbus, Ohio members participated in a service project at the **Kinder Women's Care Center**, building shelves in a newly converted storeroom and sorting baby clothes to be stored on those shelves.
- Northern Virginia members meet twice a month with our friends at **L'Arche**, a community for the developmentally delayed and those who serve them.
- At our **Our Lady of Guadalupe Home for Unwed Mothers**, run by the Sisters of Charity, members prepare a home cooked meal every Friday. Every Saturday morning members and volunteers bring a hot meal to a vacant lot in South Dallas and feed men, women and children. The numbers can vary week to week from forty to eighty and some days, over one hundred. In 2012 over 3,000 meals were served.
- In Chicago, the soup kitchen ministry is ongoing at **St. Thomas of Canterbury Church** on Chicago's north side every third Tuesday. **The Mission Outreach** is another ongoing ministry where medical supplies and gently used equipment are sorted, packaged, and shipped to needy countries. A new project this year was with the Wisconsin group which collected a box truck full of crutches, canes, walkers, and wheel chairs from local area hospitals to ship to Mission Outreach.

Feeding the Poor

- Syracuse serves at least 6 **pancake breakfasts** a year in one of the most poverty stricken areas in the city.
- The Kansas City Chapter began serving dinner to the poor at **St. James Place Food Kitchen** on every 5th Friday. Members also assisted there at the annual "T-shirt and BBQ Dinner" with over 500 being served.

At **Our Lady of the Angels Mission** on the west side of

Chicago, over 1000 people were served lunch and for six years the Order's members have been involved in the clean-up and restoration of this parish.

- The Houston Region's signature project is the **Catholic Charities' Mamie George Community Center**, which has been remarkably successful in feeding the needy throughout the community. Volunteers also serve Monday through Thursday every week at **St. Martha's Kitchen** in Houston's 2nd Ward. The Kitchen serves meals daily Monday through Friday to more

than 1500 people. It is managed by the Sisters of the Divine Providence.

- Hartford members support 130 families through the local **Malta Food Pantry**, an outreach of **Malta House of Care** which provides an extraordinary mobile health clinic.
- Montgomery County and Washington DC members volunteer each month to prepare and distribute food packages at **SHARE**, a program started by Order of Malta members 15 years ago.

- Members of the Baltimore Region currently cook and serve dinner monthly to approximately 150 women and children at **My Sisters Place Women's Center**, an outreach of the group home for formerly homeless women. The center is an invaluable resource for women, offering health information, return to work programs, and financial planning.

Tending to the Sick and Elderly

- Lancaster obtained a grant to configure a Malta Community Room at **St Anne's Retirement Community** where local members provide service to the elderly residents.
- Kansas City members began working with the **Little Sisters of the Poor Jeanne Jugan Retirement Center**. Besides transporting residents to our annual Anointing Service Mass,

members assist with maintaining the Shrine Gardens on the Little Sisters' Campus.

- The Houston region meets the first Saturday of each month at the **VA Hospital** in Houston for Mass and to distribute Holy Communion to our Catholic Veterans who are receiving treatment at the hospital.
- The Dallas region supports **St Paul's Hospital** with five Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion that minister and offer communion every Thursday to all the Catholic patients in the hospital.
- Baltimore members have been involved with the operations and volunteer work at **Shepherd Clinic**, which provides quality health care for the uninsured through the use of volunteer physicians, nurses, and others.

Defense of the Faith Activities

- The Lancaster region celebrated its sixth year of holding a semi-annual Defense of the Faith Series with Mass and lecture. Dr. Marie Hilliard spoke about religious liberty in her address titled, "Liberty and Justice for Some." Dr. Trevor Martenson gave a compelling lecture on "Love, Respect and Responsibility: An Explanation of Christianity's Traditional Teaching on Artificial Contraception."
- Syracuse invited Dr. Robert George from Princeton and Dr. Peter Kreeft from Boston College to discuss matters of faith. Over 250 people attended both of these luncheons.
- The Houston region's defense of faith committee sponsored an event at the University of St. Thomas for the defense of marriage. The President of the National Organization for Marriage, Brian S. Brown, was the main speaker at this event and more than 200 attended.
- The signature project of the Memphis Region is the Catholic Cafe, a weekly syndicated radio and internet broadcast which teaches the Catholic faith in an engaging, informative manner, and reaches people throughout the world. Additionally, the region organized Friar Fest, a weekend celebration of faith for teenagers in the Memphis Diocese, bringing eight friars from the Franciscan Friars of the Renewal to minister to the young people.

Lourdes Pilgrimage—2012

On May 3 the Federal Association contingent of nearly 300 knights, dames, candidates, chaplains, auxiliary, malades and their companions landed in France to participate in the Order of Malta's annual Lourdes Pilgrimage. Most of the pilgrims flew from Baltimore on the charter aircraft and were greeted upon arrival by a dozen members of the Advance Team. This is a group of knights and dames who arrive a few days early to make sure the hotel rooms are set and to secure the voitures or carts used to transport the malades.

Leading the group was the Association's Principal Chaplain, His Eminence Donald Cardinal Wuerl, Archbishop of Washington. The Cardinal was engaged in every aspect of the pilgrimage for the days he was able to be in Lourdes—the Opening Mass for the three U.S. Associations, the Healing Mass, and the Candlelight Procession. Generous with his time, he had a smile and kind word for everyone, and his presence was a special blessing for the group.

Before every activity the group gathered in the cramped, semi-covered carport behind the hotel. There 300 hundred people walked purposefully in every direction, assembling 50 voitures with malades. With a steady rain falling during many mornings, first time pilgrims doubted this would ever work. Yet each time, everyone was lined up, out the door, and at the venue right on time. Some thought this was a miracle while others attributed it to the decades of experience and calm presence of the six Team Leaders whose job was to keep

the 40–45 people on their team healthy, happy, in line, and on time throughout the week.

After being in or very near the Domaine, the sacred area where the Grotto, Rosary Basilica, and other venues are located, for the first four days, the group visited the “upper town” of Lourdes.

On Tuesday, the last day in Lourdes, the Federal Association's group celebrated Mass in St. Joseph's Chapel. After being with huge crowds in enormous venues all week, this intimate setting was a special way to end the spiritual week. That spirit of fellowship took a different shape on Tuesday night during the farewell banquet—an evening of laughter, song, and, maybe, a tear or two.

The Abiding Significance of Papal Recognition

On February 15, 2013, the Sovereign Military Hospitaller Order of Saint John of Jerusalem, of Rhodes and of Malta commemorated the 900th anniversary of its initial papal recognition in the sacred bull in the sacred bull of Pope Paschal II, *PIE POSTULATIO VOLUNTATIS*. In that document the Holy Father set in course the juridical operation of The Order founded in the late eleventh century in Jerusalem by Blessed Brother Gerard. As a Benedictine himself, undoubtedly Pope Paschal appreciated the religious character of Brother Gerard's hospital, and his adherence to a rule modeled after that of the Benedictines and Augustinians.

Although the precise date of the foundation of Brother Gerard's hospital has been lost to history, the institution was a thriving activity by the time of the European Crusaders' arrival in the city in 1099, four short years after Pope Urban II had delivered his inspiring address to the assembled clergy in the Council at Clermont in France. That address, which stirred the continent of Europe to take action in the face of Muslim advances in the Eastern Mediterranean, began the crusading movement that would dominate both papal and political policy in Europe for the next 200 years.

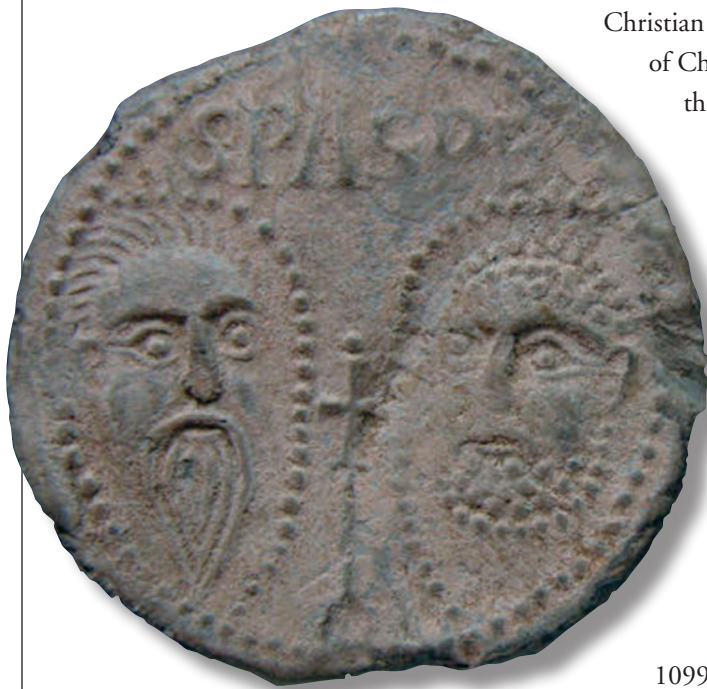
Concerned by growing reports of strife in the Holy Land, molestation of Christian pilgrims, and the reality of Christian vulnerability at the hands of Muslim Seljuk Turk invaders after the fall of the Byzantine army in the Battle of Manzikert in Asia Minor in 1071, Pope Urban articulated the need for an offensive to liberate the Holy Places from control by those who did not believe in the divinity of Jesus Christ.

Pope Urban died in 1099, a few weeks after the Crusaders whom he had inspired had liberated the Holy City from



Muslim control. At that time the election of Ranierius, a Benedictine monk of the Cluniac tradition, who had been elevated to the College of Cardinals in 1076 under the title of Cardinal Priest of San Clementi in Rome by Saint Gregory VII during the height of the lay investiture controversy, signaled the onset of a strong papacy.

As with his recent predecessors, beginning with Saint Gregory, Pope Paschal faced growing problems with the Christian powers of Europe, a constant impediment to papal support for the Crusades. The lay investiture struggle continued unabated throughout Pope Paschal's long papacy

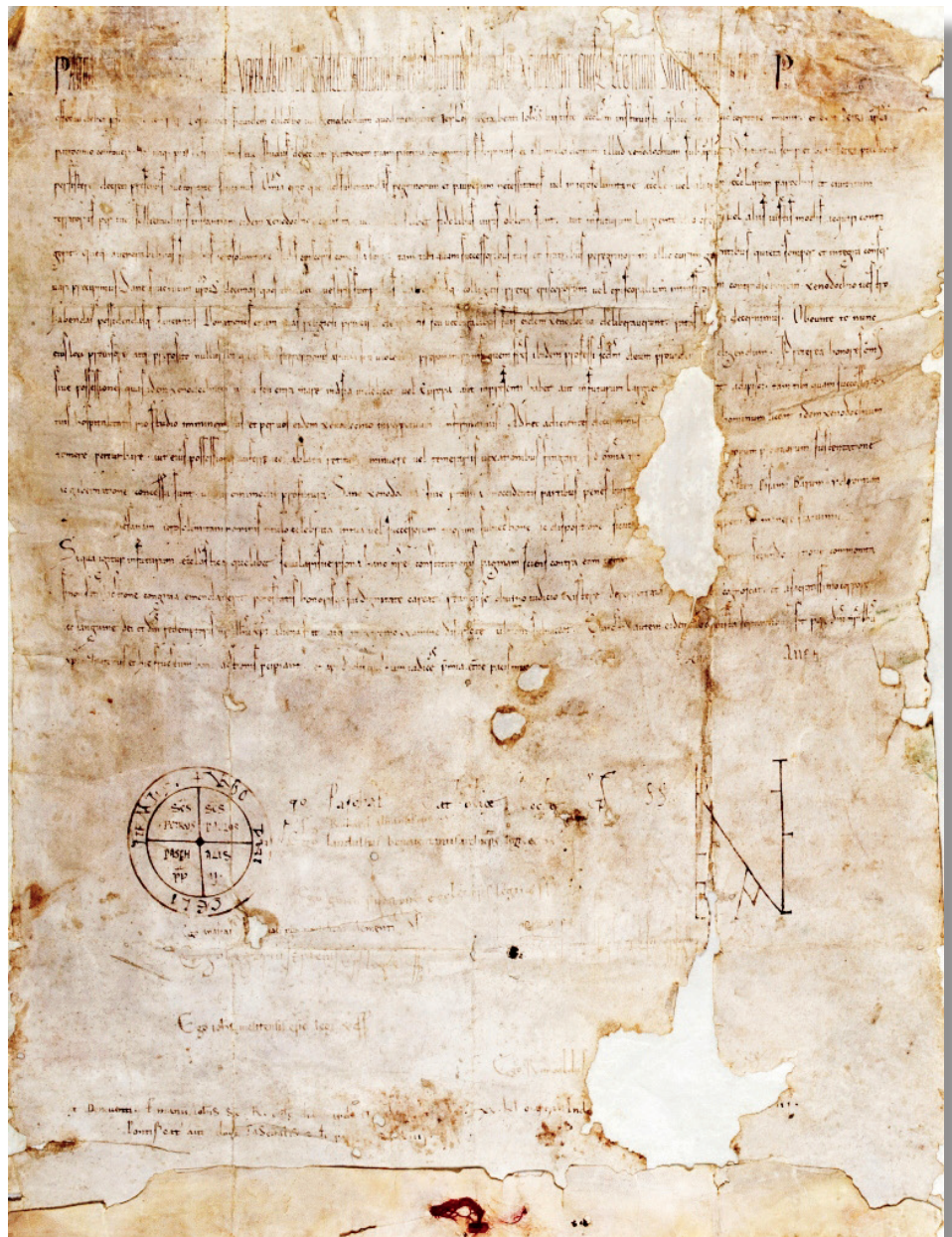


of eighteen years. His conflict with the Holy Roman Emperor Henry V was as difficult as that of Gregory VII's with his father, Henry IV. He also faced a similar controversy involving lay investiture with King Henry I of England.

In granting the bull of 1113, Pope Paschal not only cemented Brother Gerard's establishment as a religious order of the Church, but also granted it the juridical independence that has made possible the service aspect of its mission to Our Lords, the Poor and the Sick, which has been its hallmark for the past 900 years. His decree established The Order of Saint John as the first of the great crusading orders that characterized medieval piety and fidelity to the papacy, thereby beginning the tradition that survives, indeed thrives, down to our own day.

In his decree Pope Paschal gave The Order an exempt status free of any juridical oversight save that of the Pope himself, the unique character of The Order that was the beginning of its ultimately attaining and maintaining recognition as a sovereign entity. Centuries later, the ecclesiastical independence from all authority save that of the Pope became the basis upon which The Order was able to survive beyond the loss of its territorial possessions at the end of the eighteenth century.

Pope Paschal II remains one of the most significant popes of the Middle Ages. His reign manifested adherence to what today we might think of as modern church-state relations with the Pope supreme in ecclesiastical matters,



free from political interference, and concerned directly with the Church's religious mission. During his long reign of eighteen years he steadfastly articulated papal independence from political control, and in that area he prefigured the modern era in which the Church, and The Order of Saint John, which he

recognized 900 years ago, could follow the biblical mandates in working for both the spiritual and material betterment of mankind in this life, leading to salvation in the next.

Defense of the Faith Programs and Funding Activities

The Defense of the Faith Committee assists knights and dames to fulfill the promise they make in the Daily Prayer of the Order: Be it mine to practice and defend the Catholic, the Apostolic, the Roman faith against the enemies of religion.

In 2012, educating knights and dames about their Catholic faith and about contemporary challenges to it was a primary activity of the Defense of the Faith Committee. In addition, the Committee supported member-sponsored Catholic organizations which promote and defend the Catholic faith, and sponsored an essay contest to stimulate college students to think about what their faith means to them while introducing the students to the Order of Malta.

Education

The committee produces two educational programs each year for the entire membership. The spring program of general faith education is designed to inform and strengthen the faith of members in the many regions where they reside. The fall program during Investiture Weekend in Washington, DC, aims to educate members about a contemporary issue which is challenging Catholic beliefs and practices.

The fall program, presented by Archbishop William E. Lori of Baltimore on “Challenges Facing Catholics in America Today,” took place on Friday, October 19, in Washington, DC. Approximately 275 knights and dames attended. Archbishop Lori discussed the threats to religious liberty currently facing the Church and its charitable works from a general widespread secularization in society, with a resulting lessening of regard and understanding of religiously motivated social action, and more specific challenges as exemplified by the contraceptive insurance mandate proposed by the Department of Health and Human Services and the redefinition of family and marriage that affects Church social services such as adoption services. A podcast of the Defense of the Faith Forum is available on the Federal Association’s website along with podcasts of past fall programs.

In spring 2012 the committee distributed to members 900 copies of Cardinal Wuerl’s new book, *Seek First the Kingdom*, a roadmap for lay persons on defending the faith in American culture. The Defense of the

Faith committee issued email alerts to members, principally at the request of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), to inform members about particular challenges to Catholic beliefs and practices, so that they as individuals could give effective personal witness to their faith in whatever way they deem appropriate.

Grants

Between January 2012 and January 2013, the Committee recommended six grants applications for approval by the Association’s board of directors. Five of these grants were either \$5000 or \$10,000. While the committee ordinarily limits grants to \$10,000 or less, in 2012 an urgent request by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops to all three U.S. associations of the Order prompted the committee to recommend that the association renew its grant of \$50,000 in Defense of the Faith funds to the USCCB for the bishops’ new Ad Hoc Committee on Religious Liberty. This committee advises church leaders as they strive to defend the constitutional right to religious liberty presently under attack in federal and state governments. Comprised of several bishops and distinguished expert consultants, the committee includes two members of the Federal Association. It will consider government actions in light of constitutionally-protected rights, will conduct campaigns to inform the public, and will advocate in legislatures for the restoration of religious liberties.

FOCUS Essay Contest

“What you are is God’s gift to you; what you become is your gift to God.” The Defense of the Faith Committee used this quote from the Catholic theologian Hans Urs von Balthazar to break new ground by introducing an essay contest for college students in partnership with the Fellowship of Catholic University Students (FOCUS). Students were asked to write a 500–1000 word essay on the question, “Describe a pivotal point in your faith life when you realized you were a gift from God. How are you trying to become a gift to Him?”

The contest was announced in October to over 25,000 college students on 85 Catholic and secular college campuses in the U.S.

Over 100 essays were submitted. FOCUS posted the top eight on its website so other students could vote on them. The Defense of the Faith Committee took student voting into account, but also looked for stories of transformation as well as ability to inspire other students.

Four college students were declared winners and awarded cash prizes. First prize went to Raquel Kato Greely of the University of Colorado for her essay “I’m That Girl—



That Girl That Got Pregnant.” Raquel wrote: *“That day, God gave me the grace to feel His presence... For the first time in over a month of depression and turmoil and shame, I felt loved—in the midst of my brokenness. I realized that God gifted me not only with my life, but also entrusted to me the life growing inside me.... By the grace of God alone, I cancelled my abortion.”* The winning essays were posted on the FOCUS blog after the awards were made.

Grants Fund Projects in the US and Abroad

“Be it mine to practice charity toward my neighbors, especially the sick and the poor.” With these words the knight and dames of the Order of Malta daily reaffirm their commitment to charity, compassion and the unselfish sharing of their talents, treasure, and blessings. And so it is that each year the Grants Committee of the Order is grateful to learn of the numerous projects and programs in which members of the Order generously devote hours of service in support of their passion for practicing charity.

During 2012 the Federal Association responded generously and provided \$700,000 to forty programs for which knight and dames provide hands-on support in soup kitchens, homeless shelters, health-care clinics, programs for the impaired, refurbishing homes just to name a few of the roles members of the Order play in the provision of assistance to those in need. It is the active involvement of members in these

programs that weighed most heavily in the decision to provide financial support through a Federal Association Grant.

Responsiveness to crisis resulting from natural disasters has been an earmark of the Federal Association, with Haiti a now long-standing focus for members of the Order. In 2012 hurricane Sandy devastated many communities along the New York and New Jersey coast. In response to a request from Catholic Charities, the Federal Association Board provided \$50,000 in emergency funding to Our Lady of Sorrows Church in Sayreville, New Jersey—assisting 400 families in particular distress in securing much needed items after the destruction of their homes.

Flood waters ravaged Lourdes, France during 2012. Pilgrimage facilities were threatened and many domain structures were impacted. In concert with Malta chapters around the world, the Federal Association Board provided an initial grant of \$10,000 to a fund designated for the restoration of these blessed grounds.

Malteser International, an international relief organization of the Order of Malta, brings aid to nations around the world which lack the resources to address the needs of their sick and poor. Annually the Federal Association supports Malteser International efforts with a grant. In 2012 the Federal Association Board provided \$50,000 as all three USA-based associations joined in funding the establishment of a Western Hemisphere office in Miami, Florida to better serve Central and South America as well as the Caribbean basin.

The Annual Appeal reflects the generosity of Order members and that generosity provides the resources upon which the Board of Directors and the Grants Committee rely to underwrite funding requests made to the Federal Association. Truly 2012 was a year of collaborative funding with our sister American associations, with worldwide Malta chapters and with international relief providers, “striving ever to promote God’s glory, the world’s peace and all that may benefit the Order of St. John of Jerusalem.”

The chart included with this report illustrates the many places, programs and purposes that have been enhanced through the generosity of Federal Association members. The Grants Committee believes that each is a testament to the volunteers who facilitate, the board members who guide, the staff who executes, and the recipients who graciously accept the gift of caring. Each initiative deserves to be highlighted; however, the following program speaks well to the fulfillment of the mission to care for the poor and the sick.

Grants Program—2012

St. James Place at the Bishop Sullivan Community Center, Kansas City Missouri is one of the largest producers of emergency assistance in the Kansas City area. Their mission is to provide basic necessities to people who are unable to do so and to move those who are able to become self-sufficient.

Last year St. James Place found itself unable to serve a hot meal to their guests because the kitchen equipment could no longer be relied upon. Knights and dames of the Kansas City chapter of the Order of Malta, who serve meals at St. James Place, requested funding to replace/repair the failing kitchen equipment. Program Director, Doug Langner, reports “last year (2011) we averaged 280 meals per evening. Replacing our old kitchen equipment was a blessing. When it would break down we could only serve packaged meals to our clients instead of a hot meal. This year we received the Health Department’s highest award for food safety and handling. And, we are on pace to serve 7500 meals in 2012. Thank you for assisting with the funding that made it possible.”

When asked what one hot meal means to you, clients Jeanette and Steve, a husband and wife in their 30s going through a rough stretch of their lives, responded, “This meal means we have ‘dignity.’ We don’t have to look for food out of a dumpster. We can come here and know we are in a safe place.”

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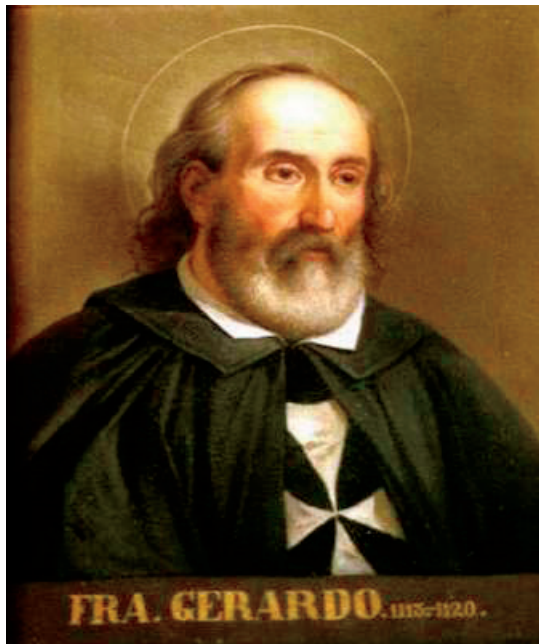
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The Blessed Gerard Society
